Committed to Tillydrone

Councillor Ross Grant updates us on the latest regeneration plans for the Tillydrone Community

wanted to take stock of the work that this Council has already done since 2012 to make living in Tillydrone better for residents and also to highlight our ambitions for the area in the future. The Council has spent or already committed to spend over £40 million in Tillydrone in its financial planning in recent years. This Council has been fully committed to the housing modernisation programme in the area, delivering new kitchens, bathrooms and new central heating systems.

I am particularly pleased to see that the installation of the new Combined Heat & Power (CHP) heating systems at the Tillydrone multi storeys is nearing completion. Around £5 million has been spent connecting almost 500 properties to the heat and power system which is much more efficient and affordable. The CHP system will halve fuel bills for everyone with the system, taking many of our residents out of fuel poverty while reducing carbon emissions by 90%.

We are incredibly proud of the £3 million Riverbank Primary school

extension that this Council delivered in 2013 which has been greatly welcomed by the parents, the staff and the pupils of the school. It is great to see this facility in use with the pupils thriving as a school community and achieving so much which is a credit to our staff and our community.

To encourage our children to be fit and active, this council has continued to improve our existing play parks in the area, most notably the 'Donny Park' at Gordons Mills Road. It is also fantastic to see the recent announcement of a full refurbishment of the Alexander Terrace play park. This will be delivered in consultation with local residents in the coming months. We will continue to ensure that our play parks are kept up to a safe and appealing standard.

Going forward, as a Council we fully recognised that Tillydrone also needs a focal point for all of the vital community work that goes on in the area. Working jointly with the community groups in the area, we have committed £3 million to progress

plans to deliver a state of the art community hub right at the heart of Tillydrone. Our community needs and deserves to have a new community facility providing a place for residents to shop, to meet and to enjoy the many great services that are delivered in the area. The news that the Council have earmarked the existing Tillydrone Shopping Centre as the location for the new community hub was based upon the feedback of the recent community consultation which showed that this was the most popular location to site the hub.

Of course, while so much positive regeneration is taking place in the area, we recognise that for Tillydrone to continue to thrive, and for people to have better life chances, the council will have to build on the work that we are delivering. With so many suggestions emerging from the community consultation, we will be looking to take as many of them forward in the coming months and years so keep an eye out for more positive projects being delivered in the area.

What's in a name

The Tilly Tattle's very own historian, Margaret Mead aims to bring our readers a touch of local history. All the streets in Tillydrone have been named after people and Margaret will be bringing you the stories behind these characters. From Bradley to Dill, Coningham to Alexander, there's a story behind them all so read on to find out more.

Bradley Terrace

In my research I could not find a British hero of World War II, but found an American who fought alongside General Alexander and Field Marischal Montgomery.

Omar Nelson Bradley was born in Randolph County Missouri on 12 February 1893.

He passed a test for West Point. Before West Point he was employed as a boiler maker at Warsash Railroad. He was

encouraged by his Sunday School Teacher to try the test for West Point Military Academy. He had planned to save so he could attend the University of Missouri where he intended to study law.

He graduated from West Point in 1915, as part of a class that produced 59 Generals during World War II.

He became a General by the year of 1943. Bradley and Patton

were always in conflict with Montgomery over his ordersBradley was nicknamed the G.I. General.

After the war he was made Chief of Staff of the United States Army. He died 8 April 1981 and was buried in Arlington National cemetery in Arling for Country Virginia US.





Coningham Road, Terrace and Gardens

Arthur Coningham (RAF Officer) Air Marshal, Sir Arthur "lazy" Coningham, KCB, KBE, DSO, MC, DFC, AFC, born 19 January 1895 and he presumably died 30 January 1948.

His early life was spent in Brisbane in Australia. His father, also Arthur Coningham, was a noted test cricketer for Australia. He was found out to be a conman. To escape scandal he moved his family to New Zealand. He did not change and was jailed for 6 months for fraud. Young Arthur as a teenager rebuked his father by saying "you may be my father but I am ashamed of you."

Arthur Coningham was a sober living person, he neither smoked or drank or swore.

During World War I he fought in Gallupoth with the New Zealand Expeditionary Force.

He developed typhoid fever and was invalid and put out of service in March 1916. In April he made his way to England and volunteered for the Royal

Flying Corps. He was posted to the 32 Squadron on 19th of December after training. He was injured during battle with the enemy, He returned to France and promoted to Major in command of 92 squadron on the 1st of July 1918, at the age of 23. On the 11th of August he was injured again in an intense air combat but remained in France. He engaged in 176 Patrols over enemy lines. Coningham emerged from this war with 2 awards - DSO and a Military Cross earned while with the 32 Squadron. He was nicknamed Mary (a play on Maori) which made reference to his earlier life in New Zealand.

Between the wars Coningham remained in the RAF as an officer for the 92 Squadron. During the 1920s he served as technical and flying instructor before being posted to 55 squadron flying Airco DH 9 AS out of Iraq. In 1923 he was promoted to Squadron leader and appointed as Officer commanding of the 55 Squadron from 1924 to 1926. Staff officer duties, 1st at

Headquarters of Egyptian Group, the RAF Middle East.

Serving in RAF College Cranwell Central Flying School Coningham was promoted to Wing Commander in 1931. The next year he was stationed in Sudan and while there he met his wife, Nancy Brooks Frank who was the widow of Sir Howars Frank in July 1932.

World War II

He began as air commodore commanding the Bomber Commands' 4 group which he led for 2 years. Most of the raids over Germany were at night. In 1940 he was promoted to Air Vice Marshal. In 1942, the battle of El Alamein and continued to provide air support for the troops in the Eight Army until they moved on to occupied Tripoli in January 1943. He was a successful person he returned from the Airforce on the 1st of August 1947. Then on the 30th of January 1948 the plane he as on disappeared while travelling to Bermuda.

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On Saturday the 22nd of August Donside Community Association held their summer gala. The theme was shorts and shades and the team were fundraising for Clan Cancer Support and the Donside Community Association

I think, as many others did, Nestrans (Getabout) were the highlight of the day. The range of bikes they had for the kids and adults were amazing. Our Chairperson, Jane Fullerton, even managed to go on the penny farthing! Aberdeen Lads Club

In 1923 it was proposed to have a club for East End Lads. The main object of the club was to provide recreational and educational facilities for young lads aged between 14 and a half and 17 and a half. This was a first for Scotland. The first annual meeting of the Aberdeen Lads Club was on the 4th of June 1925 at the Gallowgate, Aberdeen.

Over 450 lads attended and they planned on having 600 by the end of the year 1926. It was a flourishing group over the years and a lot of the donations came from members of the public. The club was open on certain days for people to visit and they donated clothes and other items, for example boots, shoes, suits, overcoats and underclothing, all for the wellbeing of the club.

There was football equipment, all kinds of table games and billiard tables, bagatelle balls, musical instruments, boxing gloves, books and gramophone records available for the boys.

An Invitation

The Club was open every evening during the week except in July and August and the committee invite all subsribers and other interested parties to call at the club and see for themselves the work it is doing for the youth in the city.

Girls were not included until 1957. In 1960-1961 there were 2 branches of the Aberdeen Lads Club – the Gallowgate Branch and the Woodside Branch.

Activities included: drama groups, discussion groups, Sunday services – a short service was well attended. The boys held the lessons and assisted in the prayers.

They attended courses organised by the local youth council and Aberdeen Union of Boys Club.

In the Girls Section the activities included dance classes, physical recreation, concerts, cooking classes, dressmaking classes and sewing classes.

There was also the annual presentation of prizes.

The Gallowgate building was demolished in 1962 after 37 years. By 1962 there was new premises at 21 Hutcheon Street which reigned for 10 years then further development was planned at the Mounthooly Roundabout. Once again the Aberdeen Lads Club was homeless – the Woodside premises survived until 1985 but a new site was also promised and they got the site where they remain today in Dill Road in Tillydrone. It was

next to Donbank School which is now Riverbank School. So the club goes on. Nowadays it is a bit different as there are so many more rules and regulations to adhere to.

Present Day

There is a community café open between Mondays and Fridays at very reasonable prices. It is very popular with kids and parents. from Riverbank or St Machar Academy. They can play pool or just chill out.

They run a holiday activities club which is supported by BBC Children in Need, Cash for Kids. There are also two community nursery classes, a 2s group and a 3-5 group which run in the mornings, Monday – Friday.

The after school club has around 45 children from primary 1 -7 attending on a regular basis from Riverbank Primary School. This runs between 3:15pm and 5:15pm during the school term. Activities are planned or the children and they have their own planning board.

In the evenings there is a youth work who is at the Lads Club on Mondays and Thursdays between 6:30 and 9:30pm. There are usually around 60 young people attending per session and there are activities such as football, bingo and arts and crafts.

This is a group of tenants and residents who work with Aberdeen City Council to review services - they highlight all the positives things they find and offer suggestions on how we can improve things from a customer point of view. Of course the group understand that their recommendations might not always be possible for example due to legal or financial constraints but a two way conversation takes place.

The group have been in the Mastrick Housing Office and Woodside Learning Centre where the Housing Team then finished off at Marischal College in September.

It is hoped that the final report will be available at the end of November 2015.and it will be available on the Council website – www.aberdeencity.gov.uk.

The group are looking for new members as there will be ongoing reviews which the group will be doing, including looking at empty properties, support services as well as the customer experience also we will going back to review repairs and community safety so there is plenty to keep the members busy.

So we are looking for tenants and residents who would like to get involved in Aberdeen City Council Housing Service by joining this

group – if you are a tenant of a Housing Association please get in contact with your landlord directly. \bigoplus
