Aberdeen has won a Sustainable Food Place Award becoming a Silver Food City

The prestigious award recognizes the work done by Granite City Good Food (GCGF) to tackle food poverty, diet-related ill-health and promoting sustainable and healthy local food.

Aberdeen is one of three Silver City Food award winners in the UK in 2022, alongside Edinburgh and Greenwich.

On awarding Granite City Good Food the honour, Leon Ballin, Sustainable Food Places Programme Manager, said: "Granite City Good Food has shown just what can be achieved when creative and committed people work together to make healthy and sustainable food a defining characteristic of where they live. While there is still much to do and many challenges to overcome, Granite City Good Food has helped to set a benchmark for the other 80+ members of the UK Sustainable Food Places Network to follow."

Lesley Dunbar, Granite City Good Food Chair, commented on the achievement. "It's a great achievement for the city where much of our focus remains on the mitigations for the climate crisis and cost of living crisis.

The Greyhope Bay Centre – Torry Battery's newest attraction

Residents of Torry have always been grateful to have the natural beauty of Greyhope Bay on their doorstep. Known locally as the site of the Torry Battery, due to its historical 1860 artillery battery, the area is a popular place to walk, appreciate the wildlife, and take a breather away from the bustle of the city centre.

Now, the area is part of a charity development to draw in more visitors to the area. Situated just outside of the Torry Battery, the Greyhope Bay Centre lies within sight of the South Breakwater Lighthouse. The views from the centre, which includes a café, are spectacular. The café is open from 10am to 4pm, Wednesday to Sunday. The centre also holds a variety of events, you check out the full calendar at https://www. greyhopebay.com/events

With the town laid out before you, the Sir Duncan Rice library

winking at you in the sunlight. Binoculars are available to appreciate this view or spot a variety of wildlife, particularly the dolphins, which have long drawn people from all over to appreciate their antics.

According to the RSPB's Dolphinwatch, Aberdeen is one of the best places to spot Bottlenose Dolphins. The RSPB also offer a variety of activities to appreciate the coastline, such as rock pooling when the tide is low at Torry Beach, a short walk from the centre.

Walking along the coastal path from the centre, you will come upon Girdle Ness Lighthouse, built by Robert Stevenson in 1833, and location of the foghorn known as the Torry Coo, no longer in operation.


Railway Viaduct Over The River Dee At Ferryhill Junction

The building of the "C" listed 11 span railway viaduct over the River Dee was started in 1848 by Lock and Errington.

In 1850 the first railway train (from the Caledonian Railway) crossed the River Dee and stopped at the Ferryhill Station, where the line then terminated. This line linked Aberdeen to London, and 'was to change the travelling and commercial habit of the town in the space of a few years'.

By 1854 the line began to extend northwards, over 'The Arches' to Guild Street Station. On 4th November 1867 Aberdeen Joint Station opened to replace Aberdeen Guild Street Station and Waterloo Station. Between 1913 and 1916 Aberdeen Joint Station was totally rebuilt.

Revised plans approved for former Victoria Road School to create additional affordable housing

Aberdeen City Council have approved revised plans to introduce additional affordable housing to be built on the site of the former Victoria Road School.

Project Partners Grampian Housing Association and Torry Development Trust previously had approval to build 50 units on the site, this has now increased to 55.

The five additional homes will be possible by restructuring plans for the internal courtyard and community facilities. The Courtyard area will cover two stories to provide space for an upper floor.

Grampian Housing Association purchased the former Victoria Road School in 2019, GHA are working with the Torry Development Trust to deliver a residential-led mixed use community regeneration project.

Work has begun on the site in preparation for the project to remove loose granite masonry, this has been laid aside for building during the contract.

Site safety is being monitored throughout the project as exposure to elements and vandalism are causing deterioration. The partners have appealed for parents to remind children that the site is dangerous and should not be entered.

Technical Design are also working towards the final building warrant approval and production of tender documents and aim to have these returned for review by late Autumn. The documents will be reviewed in discussion with the Scottish Government and Aberdeen City Council for the grant required to complete the project. It is expected that construction costs will rise due to the economic crisis caused by Brexit, the Covid-19 pandemic and the war in Ukraine.

The partnership are also in discussions with the council provide affordable heating to the development by connecting with the Torry Heat Network.

Craig Stirrat, chief executive officer at Grampian Housing Association said: "We are pleased to be moving forward with this important regeneration project. We have a scheme with which will provide additional high quality, energy efficient residential accommodation for social rent, set within a mixed-use site containing community facilities.

David Fryer, lead trustee with TDT said: "Despite the many worldwide factors that have affected communities everywhere, the design team of our partnership project is steadily making up for time lost in the last few years. Consent is already in place for a small nursery and spaces for local community use and we are also looking for options to create additional offsite benefits for Torry on adjoining sites."

MY VISIT TO ST FITTICKS EDIBLE GARDEN

I recently had the opportunity to attend St Fittick's community garden. It was very quiet when I first arrived but soon, I started seeing families and couples emerge on the path and soon the park garden was bustling with all sorts of people from all over Torry.

I took the opportunity to have a look at the allotments to see twelve planters all growing a range of fruits, vegetables, and flowers. The project is run by Cultivate Aberdeen and officially was launched on 1st March 2021 and refurbished old planters as well as adding new ones. The project is linked by a green walk with other projects in Torry such as the Torry Allotments, Balnagask Golf Course, Greyhope Bay Project, and the new harbour expansion. The project aims to encourage families and individuals to make good choices with food and provides a dedicated outdoor learning space to be used by children and young people. Residents will be able to help themselves to the produce once it is fully grown.

During my visit the plants were newly sprouting and weren't yet producing fruits and vegetables, but I could still identify from the labels which had lovely illustrations. My personal favourite was seeing the little white flowers which were due to start blooming into strawberries.

It was great to watch so many families come together and interact after the events of the past two years.

Lochside Academy's new editions

Every year, millions of students make the daunting move up to secondary school, packing their bags, filling their pencil cases, and dressing in uniform.

One of these schools is Lochside Academy, built in 2018 for £47 million, it is a gleaming white building with state-of-the-art learning facilities and opportunities for its students. Recently, the primary sevens from Abbotswell, Charleston, Kirkhill, Loirston, Tullos and Walker Road primary schools have spent two induction days at Lochside Academy and readied themselves for the thrilling experience of S1, which is just around the corner. During this time, they got to meet the selfless staff members alongside the crucial roles of our school police officer and head teacher.

In April, Mr Noon joined the school as the new head teacher and was committed to making Lochside Academy an even better place. He chose Lochside after being "blown away with the friendly welcome I received from young people and staff in both school and at Aberdeen City Council". We sat down with Mr Noon to ask about his plans for the school and development of Lochside academy's relationship with the wider community. His ambition for the school is clear "My vision is for Lochside Academy to be the best school in Scotland. By

the best school I mean the quality of our teaching and learning, how we challenge and support young people to achieve their best." He then goes on to say what he is currently working on "Having joined the school just after the Easter holiday, a lot of my time has been developing the School Improvement Plan for 2022-23. It is coming together and absolutely captures the voice of our young people, families, and staff." This is no surprise as Mr Noon was quick to express his passion for ensuring the voices of the school are heard. "Listening to the people and giving them a voice is really important to me. I have spent a significant amount of time listening to young people, families, and staff about where we are as a school community." Mr Noon has enlightened students by delivering assemblies that inform them how to make the most out of their curriculum. During these, he inspired students as he talked about his own experience of struggling to achieve his true potential while at school yet still going on to be successful. This is ultimately what drives him to fight for his students to overcome their obstacles, continue achieving and pave the way for a brighter future. He states "when our pupils leave Lochside Academy I want them to have the knowledge, skills and attributes to go onto a positive destination in terms of employment, education or training."

Another fairly new member of staff is Police Constable Jackson who joined the Lochside community as its full-time police officer in June last year with the aim of making the school a safer environment for students. Scotland has been placing police officers within schools across the country for the purpose of building stronger relationships between the public and police, giving schools a way of tackling criminal activity within the building, and improving the behaviour and attitude of students. Lochside Academy has had an on-site police officer since its opening, and while at first some parents and pupils were sceptical about the idea, the school community has now become mostly unphased and comforted by this presence. PC Jackson tackles a range of issues within the school and is someone who students are able to turn to with any serious problems or concerns. Recently, he has been teaching classes through slideshows and interactive activities about nontolerated behaviours and hate crimes, spreading awareness on the issues and encouraging students to avoid them and reflect on their own behaviours. The response from students on these lessons have been highly positive, many noting that it has pushed them to make better choices.
