This was a chance for community members to come together and sing popular songs with a live band made up of Big Noise staff and volunteers! # A Touch of Love makes all the difference

Touch of Love Outreach was founded by Jane Akadiri in 2020, in the midst of the Covid 19 pandemic. The charity has grown and expanded over the past 4 years from offering a hot meal in the church hall to the vast services it offers today, with Jane as the driving force behind it all!

Jane, alongside three members of staff and over 30 volunteers, provide

a variety of fantastic services in the Torry area.

For those unfamiliar with Touch of Love, they are a charity providing compassionate support from their bases on Grampian Road and Tullos Community Centre to families and ethnic minority young people. Services they provide range from a foodbank, youth groups, employability support and a family hub.

Starting out originally serving a hot meal in lockdown, then moving on to distributing food parcels across the city before finally opening a Foodbank on Grampian Road and adding a foodbank available at Tullos once a week.

Jane is determined that anyone who is hungry can walk into the foodbank and access their service. "If you are really hungry and feel that you need help and walk into the Foodbank, we will find something for you" explained

Jane. "We won't ask for a utility bill or any evidence, you don't need to prove yourself." There is a friendly face there to help, so make use of the service if you need, they will also make an effort to signpost to other organisations who can help too!

Touch of Love are thoughtful with each and every one of their endeavours, this is clear from the attention they have given to choosing their bases and what they do with them. After conducting a survey of their service users to find out what areas families must give priority to when it comes to spending, they discovered that parents felt that they couldn't prioritise mental health and wellbeing activities for their children. So, Touch of Love, set about to provide a solution to this. Launching a children's play scheme in 2022, they had over 200 sign-ups. From there, they started free youth groups throughout term time, thinking of everything down to the accessibility

of the group, making sure they'd be on a main bus route. With Young Scot cards, the children can even get there for free too. Now they have over 60 young people every Friday, it is clear to see these services are valued and necessary.

The youth groups are not just about play, while they do get to enjoy dance, music, signing, football and more, there is also a focus on building community and connections for these youngsters. It is a place where they can bond over their shared experiences. "They discuss their challenges and issues, sometimes you see them discussing systemic racism. They may have recognised that they are being treated differently to others at school and they speak to each other about it because they feel it's a safe space for them to discuss these things."

"We want people to come together, share their experiences, build that peer support. It's very important in today's changing world." Juggling the running of a charity, alongside her own business, Jane is a force to be reckoned with and whole heartedly deserves to be awarded for it. Jane was recently recognised for her phenomenal work at the Black Scottish awards, where she was nominated and won in the category of Outstanding Contribution to the African Community. While Jane does not do what she does for recognition or reward, this was undoubtedly a great achievement for her.

"There is also a focus on building community and connections for these youngsters"

She said "I was so fortunate to be nominated, I don't know who nominated me. You don't do it for recognition, you do it because you want to fulfil a need and sometimes it might even be a need that you are also going through."

Jane even continued to champion her young people on a night which should have been about her, securing them the opportunity to dance at the celebration.

Congratulations and well done to Jane and everyone at Touch of Love for all their hard work and dedication.

For those who would like to get involved in Touch of Love but are unsure of taking that step, Jane says "It's beautiful to try out new things and make new friends, you can never underestimate the power of being in a community." So why not dive in.

# A PLAY FOR TORRY

I'm Emer, playwright, director, and cultural worker, from down south, I've been working up here over the past 4 years, on issues around fishing and energy transition.

My work aims to raise up and celebrate community voices in struggles for justice. About a year ago, I was chatting with co-worker Scott Herrett, Torry resident and Just Transition organiser for Friends of the Earth Scotland. We're both inspired by the 1970s play The Cheviot, The Stag, The Black Black Oil, the legendary piece of Scottish theatre tells the story of the exploitation of Scottish lands, waters and people over the centuries. The similarity in what has been happening in Torry is, of course, not lost on anyone.

The list of those making a play for Torry goes on, so, we thought, could we make A Play For Torry?

### A Play for Torry:

So here we are, built from the voices, stories, and experiences of the Torry people, through interviews, music, and poetry, A Play for Torry, is a community-based theatre project that celebrates the land and the resistance of Torry, past and present and future. We'll explore Torry's history and current battles: from fishing and oil to RAAC and the park and it'll be fun.

This is your story - and we invite you to be part of telling it.

### What have we been up to?

In the spring, we ran a writing and poetry workshop at Tullos collectively producing poetry and writing. Some quite astounding poetic work came from this- and we made a zine 'artefact' of the poetry from this workshop. (available to download on the link here https://issuu.com/torryartefact/docs/)

### Who are we anyway?


Emer Morris - Writer/ Director and Co Producer. I've been driving the project forward with Scott Herrett, Torry resident project Exec Producer. The brilliant Nathaniel Campbell-Scott-Howells, FoSFP campaigner and Outdoor Classroom co-ordinator is our Community Producer and the extremely talented Aberdeen local writers, Mae Diansagu and Shane Strachan are the script co-writers. We've also got Aberdeen legend Jackill (Jack Hughes) rapper and producer to help create original music.

## What are you up to then?

We won some Creative Scotland funding to develop a draft script of the play. So, starting in January, we'll run a series of workshops - open to both young people and adults - alongside one-on-one interviews. Once we've got a draft, we will do a script reading for feedback from more folks in Torry.

# CHALLENGE POVERTY WEEK 2024

This year, the Challenge Poverty Week was October 7-13. While it should be on our minds more often than one week a year, the week itself provides an opportunity to bring into focus both the issues of poverty and the organisations, foundations, charities and non-profit groups that exist to help those in need. One can never have too many friends or allies, especially during the tough times.

With that in mind, Station House Media Unit (shmu) was able to use some of its resources to highlight organisations that provide help and advice in those difficult times. There was no better time or place than the "Packed Lunch" programme on 99.8 shmuFM to give local organisations a chance to not only promote what they do but be able to introduce themselves to people who may not be aware of the organisations.

Three groups that were able to send representatives to visit shmu and talk about their work and how they can help were Foyer (Marywell Street, Aberdeen), Cyrenians (Summer Street, Aberdeen) and Aberdeen Citizens Advice Bureau (Union Street, Aberdeen). All three oganisations do so much more than meets the eye. What better way

to show that than to allow those people to explain a bit in their own words.

Leona, from Aberdeen Foyer was asked about individuals or families that were employed but may be having a tough time financially and was able to go into more detail about what Foyer does on a broader scale. "Aberdeen Foyer, the kind of driving factor behind what we do is about, preventing youth homelessness, making it rare, brief and non-recurring, and also to tackle the impact of poverty on communities across the North East of Scotland."

"One of the services that we operate is around financial inclusion. Our development coach can meet with individuals and in fact through all of our services, it's about meeting people where they're at, understanding the situation, building that trust that you need because it takes a lot of courage to come forward for support, doesn't it?"

She went on to say, "it's about making sure we don't judge anyone, we're here to help... you find the pathway to get into something that's maybe a bit better, gives you a better life."

Wayne, from Cyrenians talked about the history, growth and change within the organisation and how it has evolved throughout its existence. "We've been in the city for more than 50 years now. We started off as a soup kitchen and sort of gradually evolved over the period, doing lots of different services."

Among the services that Cyrenians provides are "crisis interventions, people just coming in, needing all sorts of help. Primarily, I think people associate us with the housing, but we do more than that. There is help with people, you know, for benefits, for energy bills, for any other support. Emergency food provisions, quite a diverse range of services that we provide."

In addition, he spoke about what some of the goals groups like the Cyrenians are trying to achieve.

Obviously, one of our aims primarily is to try and eradicate the poverty ... there are a lot of people out there struggling with a lot of different challenges and we try to do everything we can to try and lift that up.

Vadims from the Aberdeen Citizens Advice Bureau explained about one



of the roles the ACAB takes one when someone comes to them for advice or assistance. "The first key principle of the Bureau is for us to empower our clients. So, the idea is we can give you the tools you need to know for your particular situation."

"It might be giving you the advice you need. So, for example, if you have an issue with your employer, we can let you know what your rights are, in a particular case, so that you know what to do at your next employer meeting you may have or going forward with your consumer claim. So, we can give you the tools."

No two clients or situations are the same and the help is structured to each scenario. "Each client is different, meaning there's different level of help that is required. If you

are in a position where you're needing that extra bit of help, for example, completing the form, for any sort of form, we are also able to do that. But the sort of first stage is we try to empower the client to be able to resolve the issue themselves."

Each of the organisations came in with one goal, helping people. Everyone that reaches out to a community organisation does so out of need, or so the majority believe. That is not always the case, as all three groups have great volunteers that take part in helping to assist the community. That was apparent in all three interviews. It is one of many threads that they share. Volunteers are the life-blood of any group that is involved in assisting a community at any level. No one

can do it alone, and that includes charities or community groups.

With the colder months and the festive season drawing near, it's a good time to look back at some issues continuing to impact constituents and look forward to the challenges we face as winter draws near.

Many of you have been in touch regarding the persistent issue of high energy bills, but also the removal of the Winter Fuel Payment and of course RAAC.

I am acutely aware of the worry felt by constituents following the UK Government's decision to end the Winter Fuel Payment for so many. This is causing significant concern as we approach winter. If you're worried about managing your energy bills or have been affected by these changes, please don't hesitate to reach out to my office for assistance. I encourage readers of pension age to check if you are eligible for pension credit. If you need help determining your eligibility, my office team and I are here to help.

I am aware council tenants impacted by RAAC continue to move to new homes. For some this has been a positive event, for others less so, and they remain deeply upset by what has happened. I would encourage anyone who feels moving home is taking a toll on their mental health to seek help either through the support options offered by Aberdeen City Council, or via their GP.

I have regular contact with the Council on issues raised by constituents regarding their move and can assure constituents I will continue to assist you where I can.

I am aware homeowners are in receipt of correspondence from the Council on next steps for their homes. I recently met with a group of homeowners, noting their ongoing concerns and welcoming positive suggestions on a range of points. I am in no doubt homeowners wish to find a fair solution that works for everyone.

I am aware of safety concerns being raised as council properties become vacant, especially as the dark nights set in. I have raised this with both Police Scotland and the Council and would encourage anyone with concerns to report incidents timeously.

Finally, on funding, I continue to raise this pressing issue with all governments, it is crucial a timely financial solution is found.

It is that time of year when leaves are beginning to fall and covering our streets and pavements. Just like with weeds over the summer, the Council team understands the need to clear leaves from our streets. The full street cleaning service focussing on leaf clearing has started and will be on for the next 8 to 10 weeks. This includes bringing in additional large

mechanical brushes to help sweep up the leaves, plus extra skips for disposal and to reduce traveling time for emptying loads across the city. The team doesn't follow the usual sweeping routes and programmes at this time of year but concentrates on leaf fall hots spots and areas prone to flooding.

Reporting issues is important to all Council services, you can always use us for this or report them online where you will get an update sent back to you once the issue is resolved. We use the service ourselves as the best way to monitor the multiple requests we receive. Visit Services | Aberdeen City Council to find report problems.

I have reported online to the services and to the Chief Executive the mess left the last 6 months at St Fittick's Park. This has been a long drawn out process this year including many visits to clear waste, you will be pleased to hear that the end is finally in sight. St Fitticks Park is classed as an open space and is maintained in a more natural way. It has regular visits from both the Countryside Rangers and Grounds maintenance teams who manage and care for the open space. The Winter team will be working on restricting vehicle access to the park.

I have raised a request for bins, skip and Portaloo's with the Gypsy

Traveller Liaison Officer.

Let me thank the Torry Vision team for the last magazine all about the challenges posed by the presence of Reinforced Autoclaved Aerated Concrete (RAAC) on the many properties in Torry. ### Dear Readers

Since I last wrote, there has obviously been a Westminster election which resulted in a new UK Labour Government. After an amicable contest locally, I was delighted to be returned as the Member of Parliament for Aberdeen South.

As you will have likely noticed, one of the dominant issues since the election has been the significant change in eligibility for the Winter Fuel Payment – previously available to everyone receiving the state pension, but now just to those who meet certain means tested criteria, namely being in receipt of Pension Credit.

With energy bills again set to rise in the coming days, the nights getting darker and the weather ever colder, I would encourage you to ensure that either yourself, a neighbour, or loved one, is claiming Pension Credit should they be entitled to it. Age Scotland estimate that 123,000 eligible pensions in Scotland currently do not do so.

With that in mind, I wanted to use this column to encourage anyone of pension age who is on a low income to check their eligibility for Pension Credit. Unfortunately, the qualifying week for this year's Winter Fuel Payment has now passed, but that makes it even more crucial that anyone who should be receiving Pension Credit

is not missing out on even more financial support at this time, especially as payments can be backdated for up to three months.

If anyone needs help understanding how to apply for Pension Credit, or any other financial support they think they may be entitled to, my office is happy to provide any assistance we can. You can contact my team at stephen.flynn.mp@parliament.uk or phone us on 01224 213 114.
